The Greater Phoenix region boasts internationally prominent research and treatment facilities, including Banner M.D. Anderson Cancer Center, Barrow Neurological Institute, Cancer Treatment Centers of America, Mayo Clinic, Phoenix Children's Hospital and Translational Genomics Research Institute (TGen). Innovative collaborations such as the one between Arizona State University and Mayo Clinic are advancing personalized medicine and health care delivery for the region and will continue to have a vital impact on the region's economy.


