Each elected official runs for his or her seat, and works to earn the votes of their constituency. The Chamber's Political Action Committee (PAC) was established in 1978 to help pro-business candidates get elected to state, county, and local offices, and ultimately improve the overall business climate in Greater Phoenix.

The PAC vets candidates and endorses them based on their alignment with the Chamber's annual Public Policy Guide and voting record.

Make sure to vote in the Primary Election on July 21st and if you're not already registered to vote, do so by July 19th to cast your vote for the Primary Election on July 21st. Voters may return early ballots by mail, deliver to the Maricopa County Recorder's Office, or return to any early voting site or polling place on Election Day. To be counted, completed early ballots must be received by an election official no later than 7 p.m. on Election Day.
